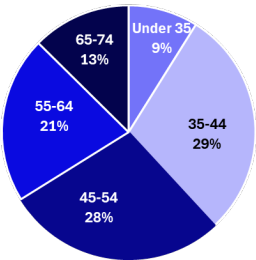

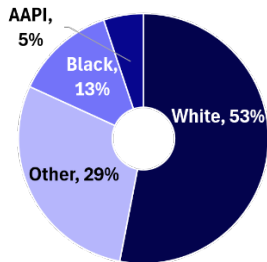
Age Distribution

Hispanic Origins



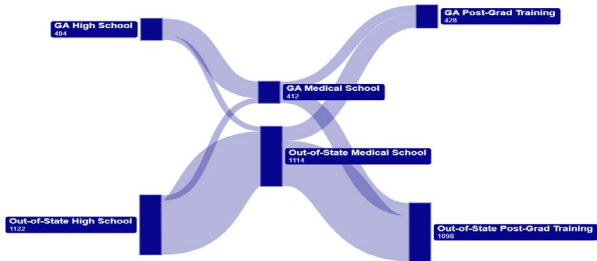

Georgia Graduates – High School, Medical School, and Post-Grad Training

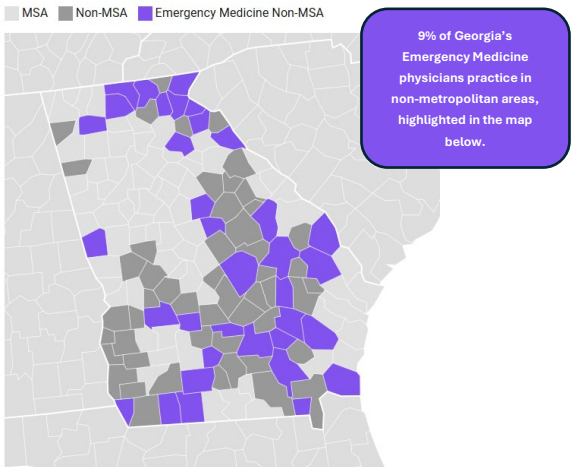

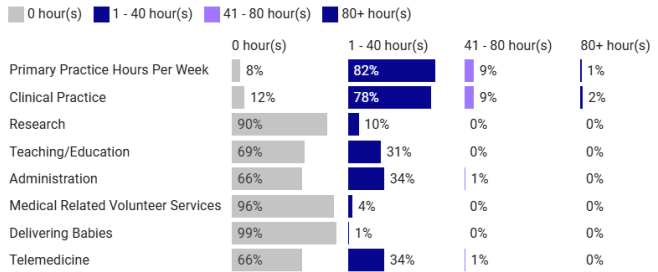

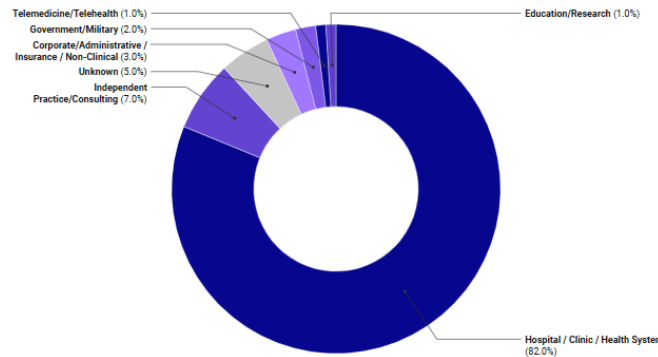

Practice Location by Type

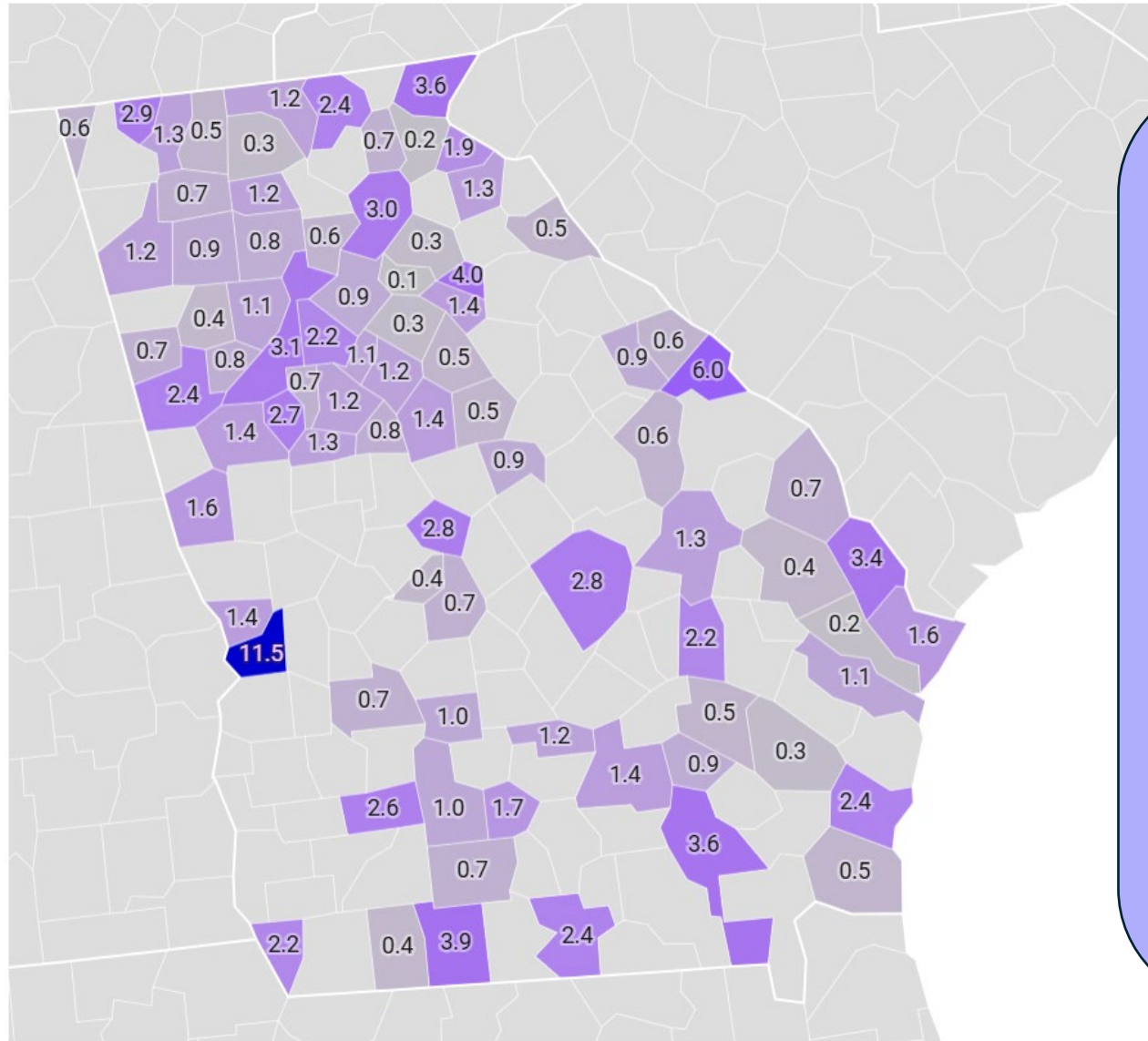

Emergency Medicine Across Georgia

There are 82 counties with **Emergency Medicine** physicians and 77 without. Locations with the highest concentration of **Emergency Medicine** physicians, per 100,000 population, include

- Chattahoochee County (11.5 physicians per 100k residents)
- Richmond County (6.0 physicians per 100k residents)
- Clarke County (4.0 physicians per 100k residents)

The Emergency Medicine specialty is well represented in Northern [Georgia](#). Most of the underrepresented areas are in South Georgia, Southeast Georgia, and West Central South Georgia. According to the [Human Resources & Services Administration \(HRSA\)](#), there will be a surplus of 11,320 Emergency Medicine Physicians in the U.S. by 2038, representing a 116% adequacy rate. However, Georgia is expected to have a shortage of 420 Emergency Medicine physicians, representing an 83% adequacy rate.
