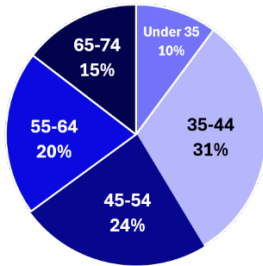

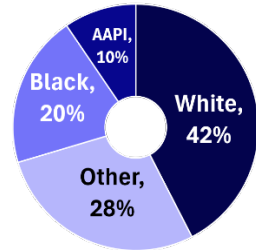
Age Distribution

Hispanic Origins



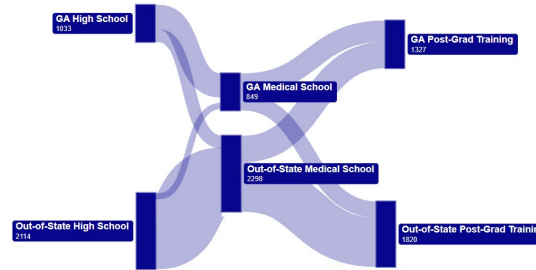

Georgia Graduates – High School, Medical School, and Post-Grad Training

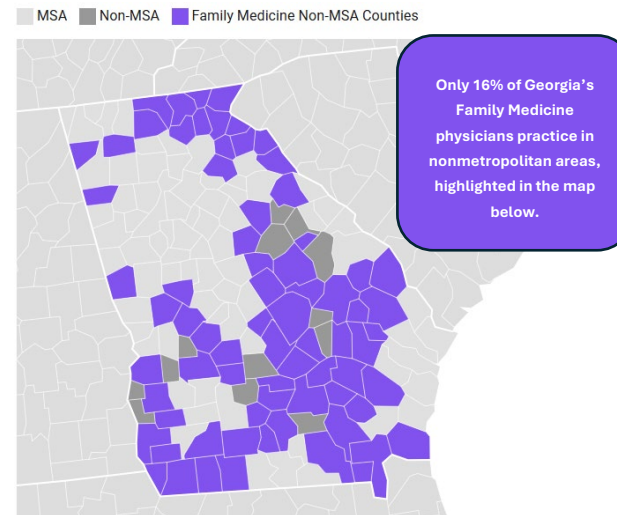

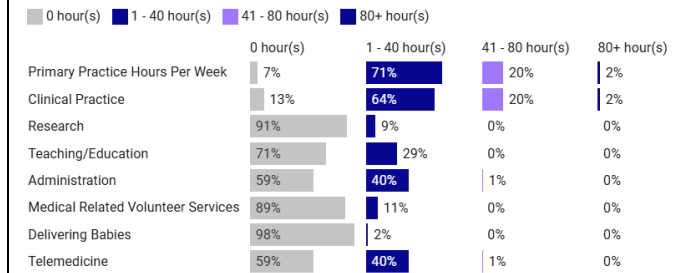

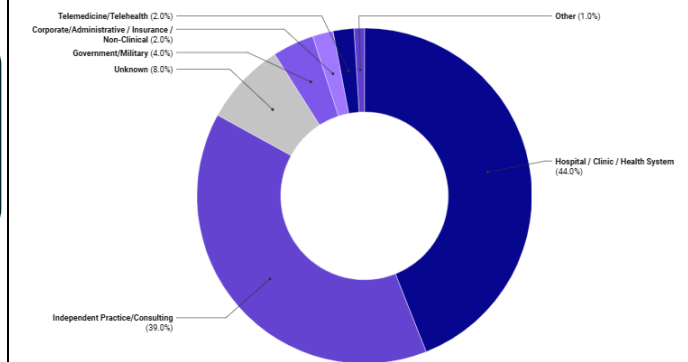

Practice Location by Type

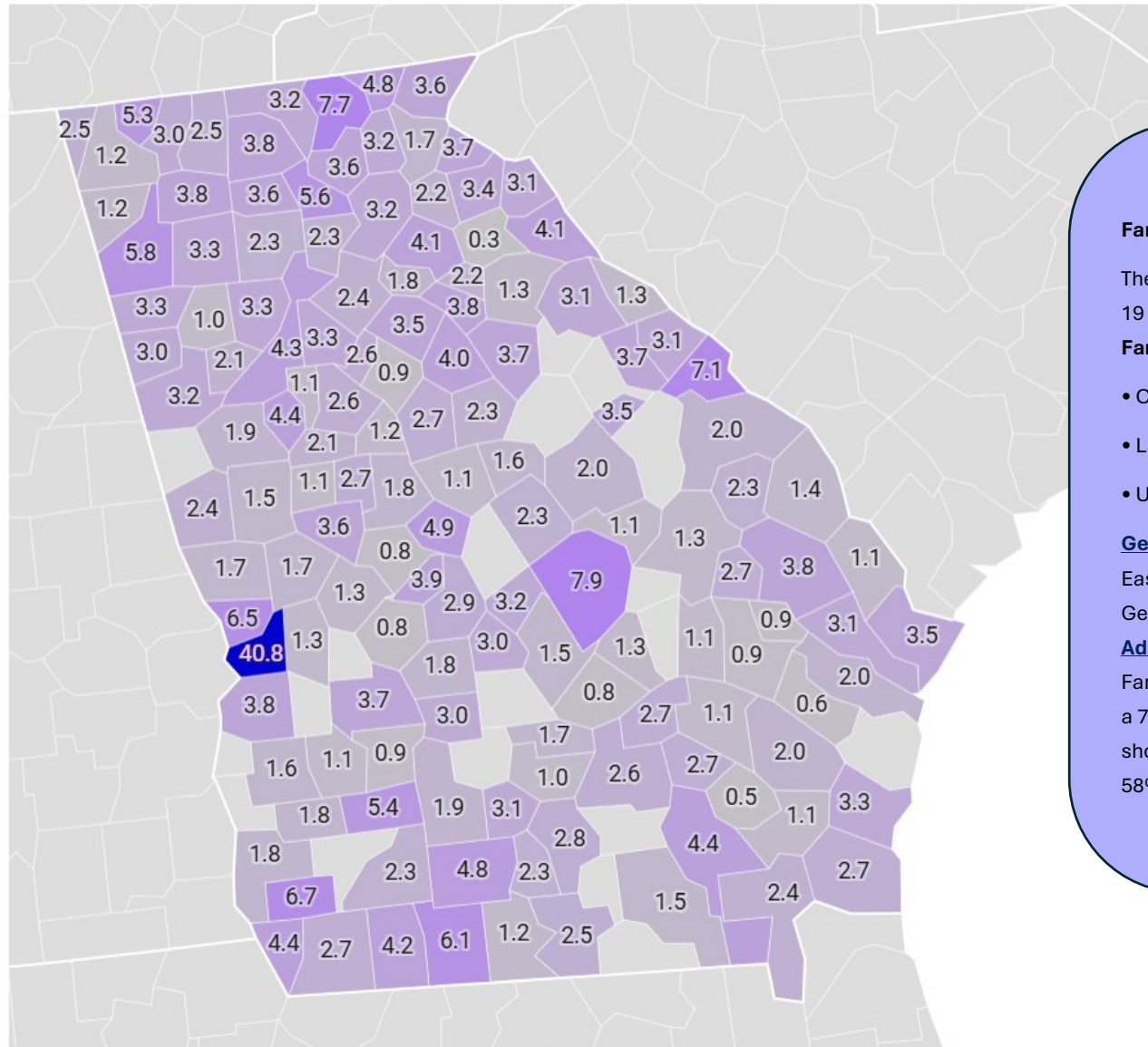

Family Medicine Physicians Across Georgia

There are 140 counties with **Family Medicine** physicians and 19 without. Locations with the highest concentration of **Family Medicine** physicians per 100,000 population include

- Chattahoochee County (40.8 physicians per 100k residents)
- Laurens County (7.9 physicians per 100k residents)
- Union County (7.7 physicians per 100k residents)

[Georgia](#) is experiencing gaps in Family Medicine access in East Georgia, West Central South Georgia, and Southeast Georgia. According to the [Human Resources & Services Administration \(HRSA\)](#), there will be a shortage of 39,060 Family Medicine Physicians in the U.S. by 2038, representing a 76% adequacy rate. In Georgia, there is an anticipated shortage of 2,280 Family Medicine physicians, resulting in a 58% adequacy rate.
